Pastoral Reflections

The Reverend David F. Peters, Minister

I ended my January 2020 Faith Matters column with these words: “Happy New Year – I look forward to a great 2020!”

Wow! Great 2020! Little did I or any of us know that we would be stretched and pulled and pushed in new directions because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

What started out as a temporary lockdown turned out to be much more than that. Your church leadership and I sought the best advice we could in this “build it as you fly” situation. None of us, church leadership, colleagues, or I had ever made these kinds of changes.

My priority for this has been communication, continuing to touch base with our members, particularly those who are in vulnerable situations or poor health, and keeping touch through worship and ritual.

I want to thank you for giving me the latitude and resources to make changes and adapting to an online worship presence. We learned a lot.

After a while I came to realize that what was needed the most was a sense of hope. That we could make it through this if we followed the health and governmental experts and remembered that the church was not dead, but changed.

You reached out and are continuing to reach out. The Deacons, on your behalf, wrote notes and make calls with a lot of positive feedback.

A number stepped up and sang as “Cantors” during worship. Sandy brought in some wonderful guest singers.

In spite of the lack of in-person worship for a majority of 2020, your offerings still flowed in and removed a worry of a financial crisis.

One of the many things that I have found to be hopeful is that this congregation can adapt, it can try something new, it can reach out, and it knows in its gut that this church, Roxbury Congregational, is not about ourselves but about a wider world.

And for this I am hopeful and grateful.

I would be less than honest if I didn’t say that I miss seeing you, giving your hand a shake or a warm embrace as your pastor and friend. Those days will return. In the meantime, I know that it is for the best and your best.

Peace Candle travels to Roxbury

Charlie Stauffacher delivered the Peace Candle to the Roxbury Church just before Christmas and it was used to light the Christ Candle for the Christmas Eve service. For those who are not aware of this program, here is some background information:

It is a flame that originated in Bethlehem, and has been shared hundreds of times across our country and throughout the world.

Each year, a child from Upper Austria fetches the light from the grotto in Bethlehem where Jesus was born. The light is carried in two blast-proof miners' lamps on an Austrian Airlines jet from Tel Aviv Israel to Vienna Austria from where it is distributed at a Service of Dedication to delegations from across Europe who take it back, with a message of Peace, to their own countries. Austrian Airlines then flies the miners' lamps containing the Peace Light from Bethlehem to New York City.

The candle was also used to light the candles we use each Sunday for worship. So the message of peace continues on!

Microcredit and Savings Project of the CDCC
Democratic Republic of Congo

Beautiful Congolese bags, clothing, and placemats through the Microcredit project of the CDCC (The Community of Disciples of Christ in Congo) are available to you! In addition to receiving a special item made by Congolese artisans, the proceeds received through your order will support many women, children, and families through microcredit initiatives of Global Ministries (UCC / Disciples of Christ) partners. Browse these crafts here.



As the Coronavirus pandemic began to spread, the CDCC has been carrying out activities to prevent the spread of the virus and to protect those who are vulnerable to the virus. Specifically, the Women and Family Department of the CDCC has carried out grassroots public health awareness campaigns, made masks, and prepared spiritual activities for women and families to promote the health of families. Since March, the Women and Family Department trained pastors of parishes in Mbandaka and Bolenge on the best ways to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and has been working with women to be leaders in the fight against this virus.



For several weeks, meetings of more than 20 people are strictly forbidden as well, meaning many of the women’s microcredit and savings groups were not able to gather for meetings. Now, with travel becoming less restricted, women in the CDCC sewing program, located in Bolenge, have sewn thousands of masks to be delivered through the CDCC local parishes. The CDCC Women and Family Department has delivered over 6,000 masks made by women in the CDCC sewing program, as well as soap for the protection against COVID-19. The wearing of masks remains one of the most effective means to avoid contamination, and the sewing of masks has helped women in the CDCC sewing program, located in Bolenge, generate an income during this time.



The Roxbury Congregational Church can be named as a beneficiary in your will and you can specify an outright gift of cash, securities, real estate of tangible personal property. If your estate is subject to the federal estate tax, a charitable bequest can save significant tax dollars.

Appreciated Stock

By making a gift of stock you receive an income tax deduction and eliminate the capital gains tax.

Charitable Remainder Trust

You can use under-performing appreciated assets to create steady income for the rest of your life. You

receive a significant charitable deduction and the capital gains tax is eliminated. Your trust can be professionally managed.

Charitable Lead Trusts

A charitable lead trust can enhance your ability to make larger current gifts to the Roxbury Congregational Church and you can preserve assets for your family while still supporting the church. You can also reduce your taxable income and your estate tax.

Gifts of Life Insurance.

This can be done either by purchasing a new life insurance policy or by contributing a policy which you currently own, but no longer need. Roxbury Congregational Church can be designated as the beneficiary of the policy, while you retain the right to change the beneficiary at a later date and otherwise retain ownership of the policy.


