Pastoral Reflections

Much has been made as of late about the truth. As we have all experienced in our lives, truth has been challenged. What we have come to rely on as truth becomes questioned in the wake of someone disputing our conviction of what is true and what is false. What you read, listen to, or talk to can in absence of scientific fact, skew how you organize your life and upon what you place the foundation of family, society, and even faith.

Truth can be something that can be proven scientifically, measured, observed, or calculated. In other circumstances, truth is something strongly believed. In the realm of faith, we can know the truth that Jesus is our Savior, our Redeemer, and God's son. Can we prove it? Not exactly. Sure, I have seen where academics have gone and proven their existence by looking at mathematical formulas, medical evidence, and observable phenomenon.

In politics, this has played out for all to observe in recent months. Evidence and first-hand testimony are contrasted with the claim that that is not the truth. And a system built on trust, honor, and truthfulness shatters our worldview and the very foundation upon which we live our lives.

Amid all this foundation-shaking, it is no wonder that as nearly every institution of society is rocked by challenge, scandal, and mistrust. Left in the rubble are people, like you and me with confusion, depression, and at times hopelessness. In the next few days and weeks, we will have to decide about the truth for us, our faith, and our lives.



With Holy Week and Easter, we are asked to affirm a truth that is not provable or

calculated. It is based on the testimony of those early people of faith, who upon witnessing the events and the people surrounding and following Jesus, have come to make the declaration that This is indeed the Messiah and that He has Risen from the Dead (after 3 days no less)

And if that was the end of it, it would prove to be a wonderful story, a tale, or inspire us and be a model of how we should live and care for one another. But much like that heart-warming Hallmark movie, after a while, we forget the details and maybe life moves on with other crises and voices calling for our attention and the original story fades into the background and maybe even forgotten.

The great part of this truth is that God does not leave us alone. God even gives us an "advocate" the Holy Spirit, to keep it fresh so that the truth might continue to shine through.

More on this next month, Until then, Happy Easter and may God's Blessing continue to be upon you as you live and be a blessing to others.





We look forward to another sale next St. Patrick's Day!


